The annual sale of ferns and companion plants will be at the Center for Urban Horticulture, 3501 N.E. 41st, Seattle, from 1:00 P.M. - 5:00 P.M. The same evening at 8:00 P.M. there will be a lecture by Reginald Kaye, also at the center for Urban

Horticulture. The fern sale will continue on Wednesday, June 17th from 10:00 A.M. - 2:00 P.M.

The Duryee garden is a magnificent blend of magnificent plants. Unusual shrubs, ground covers, primulas, alpines and, of course, ferns are all displayed in delightful combination highlighted here and there with driftwood, natural stumps and, where appropriate, rocks and grit. There is also an alpine house and a propagation area crammed with seed pans. You have so much to learn and picture here! Photographers, bring your cameras.

Philadelphia Flower Show

Produced by the Pennsylvania Horticultural Society, the Philadelphia Flower Show is the largest indoor flower show in the world and a thrilling wonder it is! From the 30' blustry winter world outside, one enters into fragrant and exuberant spring with hundreds of full-sized trees and thousands of shrubs and flowers, all in perfect, full bloom. There are enormous woodland gardens, mountain streams, old mills and water wheels, lovely gazebos and inviting patio gardens -- everything spring green, pink, white and breathtaking.

The extensive artistic exhibits with over 40 judged classes were beautifully displayed and imaginatively conceived. One class of pressed flowers had tapestry-like "paintings", very fine and sensitive work.

Most exciting to me were the over 80 horticulture classes including ferns, rock garden plants, miniature dish gardens, herbs, dwarf evergreens, succulents, cacti, glorious orchids and bulbs. The material in the show was superb, a wide variety of plants and all in excellent condition. The gardeners there really know their stuff.

Putting on a spring garden show in Philadelphia's climate is a real challenge involving extensive greenhouse forcing and the public loves it! The cab drivers all go and take their families. Everyone that we met seemed to feel they had a share in "The Show."

Fransi Lile and I were invited as representatives of NOHS to join the judging panels for the horticulture section. It was an honor for NOHS to be asked to participate and a rare treat for the two of us. So we thank NOHS for this opportunity to go as prospective judges to one of the finest shows in the world.
